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Privacy Notice: How we use Pupil Information

We, Christchurch Junior School, are the data controller of the personal information you, or your previous school, provide to us. This means the school determines the purposes for which, and the manner in which, any personal data relating to pupils and their families is to be processed.

The categories of pupil information that we collect, hold and share include:

Personal information (such as name, unique pupil number and address)

Characteristics (such as ethnicity, language, nationality, country of birth, free school meal eligibility and a standard headshot photographic image)

Attendance information (such as sessions attended, number of absences and absence reasons)
Assessment information (such as Key Stage 1 and 2 scores, internal and external examination results)
Medical information (such as allergies and existing medical conditions)

Special Educational Needs information (such as results of testing and support strategies)
Exclusions and Behaviour information (such as details of rewards, sanctions, detentions, suspensions)

Destinations of those students who leave before the normal leaving age, or mid-year

The lawful basis on which we collect and use this information

We collect and use personal data in order to meet legal requirements and legitimate interests set out in the UK General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR) and other UK law, including those in relation to the following:

Article 6 and Article 9 of the GDPR

Education Act 1996

Regulation 5 of The Education (Information About Individual Pupils) (England) Regulations 2013 Education and Skills Act 2008

Why we collect and use this information

In accordance with the regulations named above, we use pupil data:

- to support pupil learning
- to monitor and report on pupil progress
- to provide appropriate pastoral care
- to assess the quality of teaching and learning
- to comply with the law regarding data sharing
- to safeguard pupils

Whilst the majority of pupil information you provide to us is mandatory, some of it is provided to us on a voluntary basis. In order to comply with the UK GDPR, we will inform you whether you are required to provide certain pupil information to us or if you have a choice in this.

Storing pupil data

Personal data relating to pupils at Christchurch Junior School and their families is stored in line with the Trust's Data Protection Policy. In accordance with the UK GDPR, the school does not store personal data indefinitely; data is only stored for as long as is necessary to complete the task for which it was originally collected.

Who we share pupil information with and why

We routinely share pupil information with schools that pupils attend after leaving us, our local authority (BCP Council), and the Department for Education (DfE). We are legally obliged to do this to comply with our census duties and in the case of other schools, to ensure data portability between schools. All data is transferred securely.

In addition, we regularly share pupil information with a number of organisations with the purposes of furthering teaching and learning and providing additional support and guidance to students. Our legal basis for doing this is that it is in the public interest and the interest of the students to enable them to access resources that will enhance their learning. The National Pupil Database (NPD)

The NPD is owned and managed by the Department for Education and contains information about pupils in schools in England. It provides invaluable evidence on educational performance to inform independent research, as well as studies commissioned by the Department. It is held in electronic format for statistical purposes. This information is securely collected from a range of sources including schools, local authorities and awarding bodies. We are required by law to provide information about our pupils to the DfE as part of statutory data

collections such as the school census and early years' census. Some of this information is then stored in the NPD. The law that allows this is the Education (Information About Individual Pupils) (England) Regulations 2013.
